DISASTROUS BLAZE VISITS ROCK ISLAND

CLUB HOUSE DESTROYED BY FIRE FANNED BY HIGH WIND LAST WEDNESDAY NIGHT.

BRAVE WOMAN SAVES GRANDPARENT

BEATS DOWN DOOR AND DRAGS WOMAN AGED 82 TO PLACE OF SAFETY.

Rock Island, the Willamette river summer resort, is today but a blackened skeleton of its former self as a result of a disastrous blaze which swept the island last Wednesday afternoon.

The blaze was first noticed by Mrs. R. J. Smith, wife of the lessee, at about 3:30 p.m. At 4 o'clock the big club building was entirely consumed by the fire, the high northwestern winds and the dry timber in the building co-operating to bring about flash-like distruction.

Mrs. Smith, together with her grandmother, aged 82 years, was idling away time in the living rooms at the western end of the big building when peculiar and foreign noises first caught her attention. She had been playing the pinola and it was some time before she distinguished between the noises of the wind and the water of the past few days and the cracking of the fire. Going from the quarters to the dance hall she saw the peril in which both the grandmother and herself were in. The ceiling of the hall and room was ablaze and falling. She hastened her aged relative from the rooms through smoke and heat and into the basement, sometimes dragging the elderly woman. Exit from the front and side doors was entirely cut off and upon reaching the basement it looked for a time as if they were to be twarted here too; the door was belted. A stick of cord wood vigorously applied broke down the door and gained for the trapped prisoners freedom and life. Mrs. Smith placed her grandmother in a position of safety and then entered the burning stucture and succeded in saving some clothing and family silverware, bed-linen and a few trinkets. A mandolin, an hierloom in the family was burned although Mrs. Smith tried repeateded attempts to reach and save it.

The Smith family lost practicaly everything. The winter's supply of provisions and all their furniture and considerable stock of summer merchandise to the extent of \$3300 was burned. No insurance was carried on this although the building was insured.

The building was owned by the Portland Rowing Club from whom Mr. Smith leased. It was a big two story affair handsomly decorated and furnished

throughout and know far and near among pleasure loving excurstionists. It was built in 1902 or 1903 by Peter Kerr for the old Rock Island Club and () sold to the present owners. The building and equipped resort was valued at \$35,000.

Mr. Smith, who was in Portland at the time, is of the opinion that defective wiring caused the fire. He says that from what he can learn from his wife the blaze started in the ceiling. Several weeks ago an inspector made an examination of the wiring and reported all well, but Smith is yet of the opinion that that was the cause. He says there no fire in the stove at the time.

It was first feared that the trees and folage of the island were entirely ruined but Mr. Smith says that once the smoke cleared away he made an examination with the result that he has announced that only portions of the trees were touched by flames and that next season one will never know that a fire had visited the place from appearances. He will transplant and reseed where necessary.


A new dancing hall, a sort of an open air pergola, will be constructed as well as numerous tent houses for camping purposes and the resort reopened in May as if nothing had happened. Fifty season reservations have already been made.

The fire attracted spectators from far and near. A press reporter and J.E. Keck were perhaps the first on the scene. The launch, Junita, operated in the summer as a ferry between the island and Milwaukie was taken from her winter moorings and hastened to the scene bearing the two mentioned. Arriving there nothing was to be found of the two women known to be on the premises and a hurried search was made and nothing learned of as to their whereabouts. In the meantime the women had taken a rowboat and gone to a neighboring home on this side of the Willamette and later Mrs. Smith returned to the () when the fear that she had perished was banished.

The effects saved from the were taken to Milwaukie and later to Portland to the house of a relative of the family where Mr. and Mrs. Smith and little son are now stopping.
